A few years ago, he was looking for a way to get a university degree when he heard about PathwayConnect at a devotional. Maybe this is like your story? From Book of Mormon times, we learned that King Benjamin made sure that his children learned a skill so that they "might become men of understanding; and that they might know concerning the prophecies which had been spoken by the mouths of their fathers, which were delivered them by the hand of the Lord."⁵
